ABOUT TODAY'S OBSERVANCE

Throughout the year, our Book of Common Prayer appoints numerous festival days for the Church to observe. When these days fall on a Sunday, they are often transferred to another day so that the congregation can keep a regular rhythm of seasons. On occasion, however, the rubrics of the prayer book make it permissible to keep a festival day on a Sunday by using the scripture passages and prayers appointed. This we do today as we observe Holy Cross Day, sometimes called "The Exaltation of the Holy Cross".

Holy Cross Day recalls the dedication of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem, built upon the traditional site of the crucifixion and tomb of our Lord, and calls the Church to solemn remembrance of the acts of Jesus' cross and passion. This morning's liturgy encompasses passages of scripture, hymnody, and prayers that seek to draw us deeper into the mystery of the Cross, our life and our salvation.








COLLECT OF THE DAY



The Lord be with you. And also with you. Let us pray.

Almighty God, whose Son our Savior Jesus Christ was lifted high upon the cross that he might draw the whole world to himself: Mercifully grant that we, who glory in the mystery of our redemption, may have grace to take up our cross and follow him; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, in glory everlasting.



THE FIRST LESSON Isaiah 41: 21-25

Declare and present your case; let them take counsel together!

Who told this long ago?
Who declared it of old?

Was it not I, the LORD?

There is no other god besides me,

a righteous God and a Saviour; there is no one besides me.

Turn to me and be saved, all the ends of the earth! For I am God, and there is no other.

THE HOLY GOSPEL John 12:31-36a

Gospeler The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die. The crowd answered him, "We have heard from the law that the Messiah remains forever. How can you say that the Son of Man must be lifted up? Who is this Son of Man?" Jesus said to them, "The light is with you for a little longer. Walk while you have the light, so that the darkness may not overtake you. If you walk in the darkness, you do not know where you are going. While you have the light, believe in the light, so that you may become children of light."

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty,

maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God,

eternally begotten of the Father,

God from God, Light from Light,

true God from true God, begotten, not made,

of one Being with the Father.

Through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven:

by the power of the Holy Spirit

he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary,

and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures;

he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead,

and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son

he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead,

and the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

from Common Worship

The Leader and People pray responsively. Each petition concludes with the Leader inviting the people to respond,

By the Saviour's cross and passion,

Lord, save us and help us.

The Celebrant adds a concluding collect and the People respond, Amen.

The Celebrant bids the Confession. Silence may be kept.

Most merciful God,
we confess that we have sinned against you
in thought, word, and deed,
by what we have done,
and by what we have left undone.
We have not loved you with our whole heart;
we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.
We are truly sorry and we humbly repent.
For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ,
have mercy on us and forgive us;
that we may delight in your will,
and walk in your ways,
to the glory of your Name. Amen.

The Celebrant pronounces the absolution and the people respond, Amen.

Celebrant The peace of the Lord be always with you.

People And also with you.

The Ministers and People exchange a sign of peace.



THE GREAT THANKSGIVING, EUCHARISTIC PRAYER A




Then, facing the Holy Table, the Celebrant proceeds

The Celebrant continues, invoking the Spirit's present work, concluding the prayer, and inviting the people to join in the doxology of the prayer, saying,



MINISTRATION OF HOLY COMMUNION


All baptized Christians, regardless of denomination, are welcome to receive Communion in the Episcopal Church. If you have not been baptized, we would love to talk to you about baptism. To receive the sacrament, extend your hands so that the priest may place the bread in the palm of your outstretched hands. Gluten free wafers are available. For those who desire to receive the wine that follows, guide the chalice toward your lips to drink from the cup. We kindly ask that you no intinct (dip) the bead into the chalice. If for any reason, you don't want to receive Communion, you are still invited to come forward, kneel, and cross your arms over your chest to signify this to the priest who will offer a blessing.


