Lenten Message from the Rector

Dear Friends,

On Wednesday, March 5, our journey through the season of Lent begins. Services of Holy Eucharist with Imposition of Ashes will be offered throughout the day – 7:00AM, 12:00PM, and 6:00PM. This annual reminder of our mortality, frailty, and brokenness begins a forty-day trek of penitence, reflection, and discovery.

The shape of our worship will change during these weeks – the confession of sin moves to the very beginning of our liturgy, penitential language features more prominently, we cease singing or saying the ancient hymn of praise *Gloria in Excelsis* (Glory to God in the highest), we omit all use of the word 'Alleluia'. All these shifts and absences seek to point us toward a deeper understanding of God's presence and our need of God's mercy.

Throughout these weeks, I invite us to read Henri Nouwen's classic book, *Life of the Beloved:* Spiritual Living in a Secular World. One reviewer describes Nouwen's work in this way – "(What) began as a conversation between friends...(the book) explained the spiritual life in terms that he and other friends living a fast-paced, city life could understand. Nouwen plumbs the depths of what is most personal and vital in his own Christian faith...". I hope you will join me in reading this simple, yet profound approach to our faith.

In the Rector's Forum, I look forward to returning to a series we began several years ago. *Signs of Life: Why Church Matters* was developed for use in early 2020, ahead of the pandemic, by the brothers of the Society of St. John the Evangelist and Virginia Theological Seminary. We began it in March of that year but were unable to complete it because of lockdown measures. This year, we will pick it up again, trusting that rich conversation and reflection will once again emerge.

On Fridays, a regular time for the sacramental rite of Reconciliation (commonly called Confession) is offered from 11:00AM each Friday until the Way of the Cross is prayed at 12:00PM.

It is important to say always that these days of Lent are preparatory, not punitive. The forty days of this season seek to deepen our relationship with God, revealed to us in Christ Jesus, the One whose mercies know no ending. The acts of giving up or taking on are not about punishment, but about making space in our lives to discover afresh the ways in which God is making us new.

Know that I am praying for you, in this season and always.

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Staying in the KnowMessage from the Vestry

Parish life at St Mary of the Hills is off to a good start in 2025. Sunday youth programs are being expanded. The Rector's Forum hit the ground running through Luke and, recently, a five-part series exploring different ways to faithfully interact with religious diversity. I have had reports that other studies of the Word of God are active in different men's and women's groups. Individual studies of the Word have also been encouraged by highlighting the latest edition of "Forward Day by Day" and especially the upcoming contributions in April from our own Owene Weber Courtney. The daily readings found in Forward are those of the Daily Offices and are accompanied by a brief commentary and an opportunity to fold in your prayers and those on our prayer list. Building up this Body of Christ through God's word is a significant part of our mission, especially in trying times.

Speaking of our Mission, the Outreach Committee approved and funded \$63,733 to local, regional, national, and international projects in 2024. We have assisted in feeding, clothing, and supplying medical supplies and treatments to those in need. We have aided in hurricane relief at the local and diocesan levels and continue to do so, as the need is more significant than previously comprehended. For the third year, we are supporting water developments for clean water supplies in the newest diocese in America, the Missionary Diocese of Navajoland. We have sent funds for generators in Ukraine and supported Episcopal Relief and Development, which is on the ground during significant disasters and wars. We have five teams supplying five meals to Hospitality House each month, and I would be remiss if I didn't mention that each team is always seeking more volunteers. One thing is for sure, if you are looking for a place to contribute at St Mary of the Hills, it is easy to get involved.

In this parish, significant pledges have been made and are still being received in support of the larger 2025 budget that the Vestry passed in December on faith that our giving would match our visions for our Ministry. Thank you to all those who have submitted your pledge. If you haven't yet submitted your pledge, we in the Vestry encourage you to do so.

As I look at this year in front of us, I see many opportunities to serve Christ. I have encouraged each member of the Vestry to get involved and grow into the parish and the loving environment in which we exist. I encourage each of you to do the same. May we consider a new expression for the 3 R's - Reading, Reflecting, and Re-engaging?

'Silence Between the Noise'

Message from the Choirmaster

I am struck by Fr Andrew's recent homily in which the idea of silence played a primary role. Everything that is good and natural is calling us to silence this time of the year—the trees are asleep, occasional snow lays down a gentle cushion upon which to lay our overstimulated senses, the long nights beckon us to be still. Despite the rude, loud, chaotic, and ceaseless noise with which 2025 seems to have roared in, Andrew's recent homily reminds us—exhorts us—to create, respect, and observe silence. Communal silence.

The liturgical season of Lent asks of us the same thing. It is, along with its sibling reflective season of Advent, my favorite time of the liturgical year, largely because silence, slowness, and depth of feeling are quietly exalted. The wealth of music composed for these seasons, especially for Lent, represents the very finest that a millennium of artists have created. We at St Mary of the Hills are fortunate and privileged that our liturgies grant us the opportunity to sing music from this great body of treasures. The choir is busy at work on Lenten gems by Byrd, Purcell, Victoria, Duruflé, Poulenc, and others. Pay attention to the role of silence in this music, to the gap it provides between phrases. It's often where the magic lies.

If you are interested in exploring the possibility of singing in the choir, please chat up a choir member, and speak with me at church or send me an email at choirmaster@stmaryofthehills.org. The choir is limited in number by available space, but we are always eager to find enthusiastic singers of any voice part, basic requirements being a good ear, a workable voice, a positive and collegial attitude, an eagerness and ability to learn, and a desire to make beautiful music to the best of our abilities. Don't be shy.

Keep singing. And don't forget the silence between the noise.

Chance Encounters

Message from the Formation Director

As we round out the season of Epiphany, brimming with symbols of light at every turn, we enter a sacred season of a different kind. Stories of reflection and contemplation, hope and despair, love and hate, joy and sadness flood our senses throughout Lent. The luminous darkness pierces the soul in a beautifully balanced way, if we're open to it. Feelings of longing, love and humility, all so very real and equally as indescribable, merge into our very being.

As a people accustomed to moving within the confines of what we can see and name, entering unidentifiable spaces within ourselves, within our faith, can prove to be a little tricky. And then we're reminded: This is the space where we find Him, where God meets us.

On a windy, three-layers-of-clothing type of day, I wondered the woods of the Pacific Northwest while

on retreat during 2025 <u>FORMA conference</u> in Seattle, WA. The Puget Sound to my left, magical moss and the greenest of trees to my right, I set down a path, thinking all I'd encounter would be more woods. Then I ran right into it: The Ninth Station – Jesus Falls a Third Time. During Lent, we pray the Stations of the Cross every Friday at St. Mary of the Hills. We rotate through the 14 Stations recalling the series of events through which Jesus spent his last days. We move from his condemnation into his burial.

beautiful, moss covered monuments are awe-inspiring. I didn't follow the Stations in the order we pray them, but that didn't matter. Each of the moments I ran into a Station was a surprise encounter with God. Now, I can hold each of those moments close to me as I pray the Stations during the Lenten journey I take with you all this season. Whether praying the indoor Stations at St. Mary's or elsewhere, or while praying the outdoor Stations we share with our neighbors at Rumple, each step holds possibility and wonder.
